# RENEWAL OF BAPTISMAL VOWS AND RESPONSIVE LITANY FOR JUSTICE

## **Opening Sentences**

PASTOR JUDY: Hear these words from Holy Scripture (1 Cor. 12:12–13, 27):

Just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit. Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it.

ANDY: "I am cognizant of the interrelatedness of all communities and states. I cannot sit idly by in Atlanta and not be concerned about what happens in Birmingham..."

ALL: "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere. We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly."

MLK Jr. 16 April 1963

## **Profession of Faith**

### **PASTOR JUDY:**

Through the birth, life, death, and resurrection of Christ, the power of sin was broken and God's kingdom entered our world. Through our baptism we were made citizens of God's kingdom and freed from the bondage of brokenness. Let us celebrate that freedom and redemption through the renewal of the promises made at our baptism. I ask you once more to reject evil, to profess your faith in Christ Jesus, and to confess the faith of the church, the faith in which we were baptized.

ALL: "We know through painful experience that freedom is never voluntarily given by the oppressor; it must be demanded by the oppressed... We had no alternative except to prepare for direct action, whereby we would present our very bodies as a means of laying our case before the conscience of the local and the national community. Mindful of the difficulties involved, we decided to undertake a process of self-purification. We began a series of workshops on nonviolence, and we repeatedly asked ourselves: 'Are you able to accept blows without retaliating?' 'Are you able to endure the ordeal of jail?'"

## Renewal of Baptismal Vows

PASTOR JUDY: Trusting in the gracious mercy of God, do you turn from the ways of sin and renounce evil and its power in the world?

ALL: I do.

DANA: "Paul Tillich has said that sin is separation. Is not segregation an existential expression of man's tragic separation, his awful estrangement, his terrible sinfulness?"

PASTOR JUDY: Who is your Lord and Savior?

**ALL:** Jesus Christ is my Lord and Savior.

ALL: "Was not Jesus an extremist for love: 'Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you.'... the question is not whether we will be extremists, but what kind of extremists we will be. Will we be extremists for hate or for love?"

PASTOR JUDY: Will you be Christ's faithful disciple, obeying his Word and showing his love?

ALL: I will, with God's help.

JES: "I have traveled the length and breadth of Alabama, Mississippi and all the other southern states. On sweltering summer days and crisp autumn mornings I have looked at the South's beautiful churches with their lofty spires pointing heavenward. I have beheld the impressive outlines of her massive religious education buildings. Over and over I have found myself asking: "What kind of people worship here? Who is their God?"

## **Profession of Faith**

PASTOR JUDY: With the whole church, let us confess our faith:

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and **ALL:** earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

"In deep disappointment I have wept over the laxity of the church. But be assured that my tears have been tears of love. There can be no deep disappointment where there is not deep love. Yes, I love the church. How could I do otherwise? I am in the rather unique position of being the son, the grandson and the great grandson of preachers. Yes, I see the church as the body of Christ. But, oh! How we have blemished and scarred that body through social neglect and through fear of being nonconformists."

## Prayer of Thanksgiving for Baptism

PASTOR JUDY: We rejoice that you claimed us in our baptism, and that by your grace we are born anew. By your Holy Spirit renew us, that we may be empowered to do your will and continue forever in the risen life of Christ, to whom, with you and the Holy Spirit, be all glory and honor, now and forever. Amen.

### **CHRISTIAN LIFE GROUP QUESTIONS**

Baptism of the Lord Sunday: Mark 1:4-11 in conversation with Acts 19:1-7

#### Questions for Discussion:

- 1. Mark's account of Jesus' baptism makes a distinction between the kind of baptism John gives and the baptism that Jesus will give. What is the difference and why is it important for us?
- In the Acts reading, Paul suggests that what the disciples received in John's baptism was insufficient. Then he proceeds to baptize them again. What are some of the questions this raises for us as Presbyterians?
- 3. Share what you remember, if anything about your own baptism. If you were baptized as an infant, who told you about it as you grew older? Who baptized you, and where? Who was present to witness your baptism?
- 4. How has your baptism transformed your life? How do you live out your baptism?
