# **POSTLUDE**

Let There Be Joy



We welcome **Mehr Austin Daniel** to our worship and post-worship gathering. Mehr, a member of the Christian Church in Pakistan, has become a good friend of this congregation and today she will share with us the story of her journey to this country.

Mehr Daniel Austin is a Christian who was born in Sialkot, Pakistan. Both her parents were educated at Mission Schools and Colleges in Pakistan, and Mehr attended Kinnaird College for Women in Lahore, where she received her Masters in English Literature. She grew up attending Sunday School taught by an American, and studying and questioning the Bible was encouraged within her family. Mehr visited the US many times with and without her family, and moved to the US with her late mother, Olive, in 2015 after being persecuted due to their faith. She is working through the complex US immigration process and currently works as a medical interpreter.

World Communion Sunday (originally called World Wide Communion Sunday) is a gift of the Presbyterian Church to the larger ecumenical church. The first celebration occurred at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, PA, in 1933 where Dr. Hugh Thompson Kerr served as pastor.

John A. Dalles, a PCUSA pastor who has researched the history of World Communion Sunday notes this in his blog entry, reprinted from the October 7, 2002, issue of Presbyterian Outlook:

Davitt S. Bell (the late Clerk of Session and church historian at Shadyside) recalled that Dr. Kerr first conceived the notion of World Communion Sunday during his year as moderator of the General Assembly (1930). Dr. Kerr's younger son, the Rev. Dr. Donald Craig Kerr, who is pastor emeritus of the Roland Park Presbyterian Church in Baltimore, was sixteen in 1933. He has related that World Communion Sunday grew out of the Division of Stewardship at Shadyside. It was their attempt to bring churches together in a service of Christian unity—in which everyone might receive both inspiration and information, and above all, to know how important the Church of Jesus Christ is, and how each congregation is interconnected one with another. When I asked Donald Kerr how the idea of World Communion Sunday spread from that first service to the world wide practice of today, this is what he replied, "The concept spread very slowly at the start. People did not give it a whole lot of thought. It was during the Second World War that the spirit caught hold, because we were trying to hold the world together. World Wide Communion symbolized the effort to hold things together, in a spiritual sense. It emphasized that we are one in the Spirit and the Gospel of Jesus Christ."

Celebration of World Wide Communion Sunday was adopted as a denominational practice in the Presbyterian Church (US) in 1936. Churches in other denominations were invited to celebrate with us from the beginning, but it wasn't until 1940 when the Department of Evangelism of the Federal Council of Churches (a predecessor body of the National Council of Churches) promoted extending the celebration to a number of churches around the world that the practice became widespread. Today, World Communion Sunday is celebrated around the world, demonstrating that the church founded on Jesus Christ peacefully shares God-given goods in a world increasingly destabilized by globalization and global market economies based on greed.

#### **WORSHIP NOTES:**

The **Offertory Anthem** is a hymn translated into Urdu by Carl Dermott Monahan and harmonized by Francis Westbrook. Carl Monahan was born in South India, the son of a Wesleyan Methodist missionary. Educated at Kingswood School and Cambridge in England, he worked in education in the Hyderabad district of India from 1931-1944. He became principal of Andhra Union Theological College in 1946. He translated a number of Telegu and Urdu hymns.
